# **Director's Message**

It takes a dedicated, loyal team to create something big, and a smart organization balances experience with fresh ideas. We are lucky to have both!

We bid adieu to Bardy Wallace and Susan Beall, termed out after nine years on the board. Both have been added to our Advisory Board and continue in significant volunteer roles. Also new to the advisory board is Monica Yeung Arima, who has taken an active role in community fundraising for the Museum. She and husband Adrian Arima were recently recognized by the California Preservation Foundation for their sponsorship of the Chinese Railroad Workers exhibit produced with Stanford.

On staff, we welcomed back Crystal Taylor, now serving as Assistant Director, and thanked Lindsey Ragatz and Janet Tang for their service. New board members added since our last newsletter include:

Margaret Feuer returns to the board and is serving as secretary. A general contractor, historian and writer, Margaret has a BA from Barnard, an MA from NYU and a JD from Santa Clara. Along with 25 years in residential construction, she has been President of the Woman's Club of Palo Alto, NOW, Crescent Park Neighborhood Assn. and Palo Alto Stanford Heritage and is currently a member of the Garden

Club of Palo Alto.

John King. With over three decades of experience, John is a broker and co-owner of Keller Williams Realty Palo Alto and served as president and owner of Alhouse-King Realty, Inc. He's a member of SILVAR, CAR and NAR, a graduate of the Realtors Institute, GRI (1993), and Certified Real Estate Brokerage, CRB, awarded in 1995. He served as an officer on the board of the Palo Alto Board of Realtors, was the Governor representative to the R.E. InfoLink, District Chair for the Palo Alto

District of SILVAR (2002) and on the board of SILVAR (2000-2003). # **Museum Project Update**

Exciting things are happening - we're on course to break ground!

The Museum project is rocketing forward and donors are stepping up!









### We've pulled our building permit.

The roof comes off first in order to install the seismic strengthening, so construction has to start before the rains come. How long will it take? Based on the current labor shortage, construction is estimated to take a year.

### We've won strong city and community support.

The City is updating our lease agreement; we will review it and negotiate any changes to this 40-year contract. Council review is expected this December.

### We're closing the gap in fundraising.

- We exceeded the City's fundraising goal, raising \$1.8M in a year. The Museum has strong City support, and won the incentive \$667,000 in TDRs.
- Our county supervisors recently approved a grant of \$102,992 toward the roof. (Two more grants have been filed, for more of the roof, and for the Arnautoff frescoes.)
- The Garden Club has pledged \$3,000 for the new garden.
- And, a new, anonymous (for now) donor has pledged \$100,000.

Add that all up, and we are now within \$750,000 of having our total \$9.2M raised for construction.

### What else do we need?

Our goal is to raise that last \$750,000 for construction asap, sign the new lease with the City and BREAK GROUND on the City's newest cultural treasure - perhaps next spring.

Nelson Ng. A graduate of UC Berkeley with a degree in computer science, Nelson worked over three decades in Silicon Valley for Xerox, Sun, Oracle, Microsoft, Ariba, eBay, PayPal and BNY Mellon. He specialized in building globalized software to enable users across the world to have a localized user experience with their language and culture. Nelson moved to Palo Alto in 1996 with his wife Kimberley

Wong whose grandfather came to Palo Alto from China in 1900 and co-founded City Café, the first licensed Chinese restaurant in Palo Alto, in 1905. Nelson has been learning Tai Chi since 1989 and for the past few years has been teaching class weekly at Rinconada library. A graduate of Leadership Palo Alto, he is active in Palo Alto community affairs.

John Northway. A Palo Alto architect and co-founder of Stoecker & Northway, John won the Tall Tree Award for outstanding professional in 1988. He studied under Birge Clark (who designed the Roth Building) while at Stanford, then worked for Clark's firm in the 1970s. Since 1978, his company has provided varied architectural services including new and remodeled homes, mixed-use, commercial, retail, educational, health care and institutional projects. Focusing on products and

systems that preserve the environment, reduce energy consumption, and enhance user comfort, he is experienced in green building technologies. Johnserves the Museum as chair of the Construction Committee.

Amado Padilla. A Stanford professor, Amado is working on his latest book on the use of quantitative research methods in multicultural contexts. He combines his academic interests with local school and community service, such as two terms as a high school PTA president and a 4-year term on the Board of Trustees of the Palo Alto Unified School District. Over the years, he has served on numerous local, regional,

and national boards dedicated to improving the lives of children and youth. Earning his Ph.D. in experimental psychology at the University of New Mexico, he has also taught at the State University of New York at Potsdam, UC Santa Barbara and UCLA. He's been recognized with numerous awards and is a Fellow in the American Psychological Assn. and the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

# **New History Book In the Works**

Long-time Palo Alto resident and acclaimed writer **Wyn Wachhorst** is writing a new book of historical biographies to be published by the Museum in 2020. His book *Thomas Alva Edison: An American Myth* (MIT Press) was a History Book Club selection, picked by Choice as an outstanding book of the year, and reviewed favorably by Newsweek, Smithsonian, the New York Times and London Sunday Times. Wachhorst received his Ph.D. in American history from Stanford and taught history and American studies at Stanford, UC Santa Cruz, and San Jose State. As well as strengthening our scholarship in our exhibits, this project may inspire a film. We have
